luisiana. It was due to the activity of the members of the Louisiana delegation in the House that the opposition to the bill was reduced to one man. This was made possible by the personal relationships which they have been building up through the years. As a matter of personal regard several members withheld speeches they intended to make in opposition to the measure. Without question they could have prevented the measure's coming to a vote.

Even a more acute situation in that respect surrounded the consideration of the bill in the Senate. A number of senators were disposed to be critical of the measure. One by one they were dissuaded from voicing their opposition when it became apparent that immediate consideration of the bill depended on there being no delay involved. Finally the determination to urge the defeat of the bill was limited to two senators, Smoot, Utah, and Lenroot, Wisconsin.

Randall's Appeal Wins.

Senator Randall made a final personal appeal to the Wisconsin senator and the latter withheld his remarks on purely personal grounds. It was believed Senator Smoot also had been placated but at the last minute he thought he had discovered a joker in the bill. This led to some discus-
