HOW TO CHOOSE CHEESE

Expert Tells How to Distinguish Good From Bad.

Most housekeepers quail before that part of the family marketing which relates to the purchase of cheese, and wish the man of the house, who is usually the chief consumer as well as the critic, would always buy it. Such may find the words of an authority of value:

"A cheese with an indication of goodness will have an even colored, not mottled rind. The moment you press your fingertips on the rind you can begin to judge of the interior makeup of a cheese. If it yields readily to the pressure of the fingers and the rind breaks or does not spring back readily when the pressure is withdrawn, you have got a soft article caused by the stack cooling of the curd, a want of acid or both. At best, it will have an insipid flavor, and will go off as it ages. Cheese which feels so hard that you cannot press it on the rind is either sour, salted too heavily, cooked too much, skimmed, or suffering from a touch of all these complaints.

"A good cheese will be mellow to the touch, yet firm. Its rind will be of an even tint, elastic and free from puffs and the sample will reveal firm, close-grained, buttery cheese of a nutty flavor."

Although the Judge stands practically on the same platform as does Gen. Jastremski, still he declares that he will be the running mate of neither of the gubernatorial candidates and will conduct the fight for Lieutenant Governor for himself and along his own lines.

Archbishop Chapelle Fourth in List.

According to a dispatch from Rome to the Tribune of date October 27th, Archbishop Chapelle stands fourth on the list of foreign prelates, under the jurisdiction of the secretaryship of state and the congregation of the propaganda, who are considered available for promotion as cardinals.

In the list of Americans presented by Cardinal Gotti, Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia stands first; Archbishop Ireland of St. Paul coming next, followed by Archbishop Farley of New York and Archbishop Chapelle of New Orleans.

A thrifty Eastern farmer, being asked how he got success on a small farm, replied: "I make it a rule, when I go to market, to bring home more money than I carried away. In other words, I endeavor to sell in value, more than I buy, and to grow everything on the farm for my own use that the land will produce." This simply means that this man exercised close economy, in connection with good judgment, and this rule will invariably bring success whether on a big or little farm.

Insanity Among the Negroes.

A man who is connected with one of the State institutions recently said: "Insanity among the negroes is increasing rapidly and the people of this section will soon be confronted with a very serious condition on this account, and the cause of the increase becomes a pertinent question at this time. My attention has recently been directed to some of the forces which are contributing to this increase in the number of insane among the negroes. Contrary to the general view cocaine is not responsible for as many cases of mental derangement among the blacks as certain other kinds of poison. Drinking liquors of an inferior sort is in my judgment to be credited with more cases of insanity than any other cause contributing to the increase. There is another interesting fact in connection with the question of insanity among the blacks, and that is the waning influence of religion as a factor in producing mental unbalance. Time was when this was one of the most prolific causes of mental derangement among members of the colored race. It is not so now. I do not mean to say that religion is no longer a factor. It still plays a part, but it is a minor part. I will venture the assertion that gambling and loss of sleep produce a larger number of cases of insanity among negroes now than religion. But the more interesting fact from my way of looking at it is to be found in the large number of cases of insanity that are due directly to the use of mean and poisonous drinks. There ought to be some way of dealing with this matter. The only method is to check in some way the sale of the cheap grades of whiskey and other alcoholic drinks. How we can do this I do not know at this time, but certainly there is some means by which we can get at the thing. We will have to do it at no very remote time, and the quicker we do it the better it will be for humanity.—T-D

The lease of the Public Ferries of the parish of Lafourche, for a term of years extending from the first of January 1904 to the 31 day of December 1905 inclusive; which said ferries to be sold shall be located as follows:

- 1st. One at or within one quarter of a mile of the Angellois town, at about six miles above the town of Thibodaux.
- 2nd. One at St. John's Chapel, at about four miles above the town of Thibodaux.
- 3rd. One at or near Mrs. L. A. Goslin's store about two miles below the town of Thibodaux.
- 4th. One at or near St. Charles Chapel about six miles below the town of Thibodaux.
- 5th. One at or near Raceland.

- 7th. One at or near the store of J. T. Badaux about seven miles below Lockport.
- 8th. One at or near the Chapel of Notre Dame du Rosaire at Harang's Canal.

Cuba and Roosevelt Win.

"The President insists Congress shall give Cuba a measure of reciprocity," says our Washington correspondent. "Congress will do as he says. The situation exists merely because Mr. Roosevelt is determined to carry out the pledge given by Mr. McKinley.

"Public interest has palmed the Senators and Representatives who led the insurgent resistance with such uncompromising vigor are tired and willing to let bygones be bygones. Some of the men from the Northwest are disposed to keep up the fight for the sugar beet, but they hardly know why, and it is not likely they will do more than make a protest to establish their regularity on the matter. They will find when they come to Congress that they will have little of the support that enabled them to defeat Mr. Roosevelt in 1902.

"Candidly, their position, like that of most of Congress, either in the majority or the minority, is an unwillingness to do anything to oppose the wish of the President. Men in the great legislative branches of the Government appreciate more than anybody else just how powerful a President is. He can do things. The individuals in Congress want things done. Therefore, why fight longer on a harmless proposition like reciprocity for Cuba?—Collier's Weekly.
